





# FROM THE TREASURER

### MARLON ANONUEVO



For the year ended December 2022 The Grange Community Centre had a Total Comprehensive Loss for the year of \$43K compared to the prior year Total Comprehensive Profit of \$132K. The results include the change in The Grange organisational structure, including the addition of the Operations Manager and Children's Services Manager.

Operational Income for the current year increased by \$155K, were 16% more than the 2021 due to higher OSHC revenue compare to 2021 (2022 \$1.1m vs 2021 \$1.0m). Also, rent collected for the current year increased to \$199K from \$107K due to higher number of hirers. This is an 86% higher than in prior year.



Operating costs at \$1.2M were 28% above prior year of \$0.9M, mainly driven by the new organisational structure implemented in 2022, additional excursions and incursions in 2022 due to covid rules easing.

The Grange continues to be in a strong financial position with cash balances of \$948K to cover the value of the total liabilities of \$266K. That is, in every \$1 of liability there is \$3.6 cash available to pay off all obligations.



I would like to thank our wonderful management and staff for all the things they have done during this difficult and demanding recovery period. Finally, I would like to thank my colleagues on the Finance Committee and the Board for their work and support during the year.

### 3+ EARLY LEARNING PROGRAM

We had a wonderful start to 2022, it was so nice to see all our little friends back at the centre.

Term one saw us explore and investigate many interesting topics. As children settled quickly into the classroom, we were able to take a detailed look at Australian animals and habitats.

The children had opportunities to explore Australian animals in all aspects of learning. Through stories about these special animals and small world play, we have had Dingoes, Emus, Platypus, Koalas, Tassie Devils and native birds on our Nature Table as well as Australian animal puzzles, playdough mats and paint stamps!

During discussion about Australian Animals, we read (and re-read) 'Wombat Stew' as the children were particularly taken with Wombat Stew and we spent extended group time talking about the animals depicted and the fact that they were uniquely Australian. The ingredients for Wombat Stew were widely discussed and sourced by the children in the outdoor area, culminating in the opportunity to make our very own!







To extend children's learning, we then had a visit from some very special Australian animal friends in our own classroom!



As the seasons began to change, we began investigating the seasons of the year and encouraging children to observe the effect the change of seasons have on our surroundings. To mark the beginning of Autumn, we had a visit from a friend at Bunnings who helped us cultivate an Autumn veggie garden, children learned about the requirements of plants to grow and continue to maintain the thriving garden in preparation for our veggie soup cook up!

### 3+ EARLY LEARNING PROGRAM









We then began to touch on habitats, what do animals need? Where do they live and why? What surrounds us in our habitat? One of our educators found a mantis and we gave it its own habitat for observation before releasing back into its Natural habitat.

During the term, we noticed an influx of ladybugs around our garden, we also discovered some interesting little bugs in our tree outside we hadn't seen before, which were enthusiastically welcomed by all children!

The large tree trunk outside in our playground was covered in small black bugs. The children and educators were very curious as to what type of bugs they were as they hadn't seen them here before. The educators and children did some investigating and discovered that these black bugs were in fact called 'Lava', which are ladybugs.

The children and educators did some further research and begun to learn about the lifecycle of a ladybug. They learnt that there are four stages in the lifecycle of the ladybug. The first one being the eggs, the second one being lava, the third being pupa and the fourth being the ladybug.

The children were fascinated by this discovery and would go over to the tree to check to see if the lava had changed into the ladybugs.

The children loved letting the ladybugs crawl onto their hands and clothing and showed great care and empathy towards them.

We then brought some into our environment to further investigate their growth and changes.

We concluded the end of year by inviting all of our families in for a little end of year party. It was a wonderful end to what was a fabulous year. We wish all of our little friends the best of luck in 4 Year Old Kindergarten and school in 2023.

### OUT OF SCHOOL HOURS PROGRAM

It's not JUST DANCE! Its lots of FUN!

One of the most popular activities in OSHC during term 1 was to dance in the morning and afternoon. They have a repertoire of dances/songs they like to sing and dance to that they load up on the big screen, and off they go!

Over term 1, the children enjoyed building many Marble Runs. The children constructed, created and played with countless tracks and ideas, working in teams and individually.

During the term the OSHC children participated in 45-minute Karate sessions with Alex from Hoppers Crossing Karate. Children learnt the fundamentals of Karate, including basic self-defense.

Our community centre partnered with Wyndham Council 4-year-old kinder to take part in the National Reconciliation Week Sea of Hearts challenge leading up to National Reconciliation Week.

The children decorated and wrote messages describing their own pledges and vision for reconciliation on the hearts. Filling our entry hallway wall. Families were also invited to take a heart home to create together as a family and return to the service. The whole service displayed all the hearts together in the community centre foyer.

The children learnt about the different ways each of them show their emotions and learnt tools to self-regulate as well as support each other in regulation. Learning about emotions helped us all understand ourselves on a deeper level.

One of our students shared some anime hand signs that are performed in his favourite show, as a tool to help the character regain his sense of peace! This poster sits in our room for our children to seek out when they want to regain their inner peace.





Our community is made up of many different ethnicities and cultural backgrounds. Our children love to acknowledge and celebrate this through the music we listen to, the food we eat and through learning and practicing traditions together.

The children have an in-depth understanding about the reason behind the words we recite, when performing our Acknowledgment of Country. To represent the connection our indigenous communities have to nature, the children represented the colours of the Aboriginal flag by wrapping red, black and yellow twine around one of our trees.

Cultural celebrations give us the opportunity to introduce a range of cuisines to our taste buds. The children enjoy trying new food as much as they love trying new methods of eating, we already have some chopstick experts in the program!

This year the children were introduced to documentaries in another language, following along with the subtitles they learnt about the independence of children in Japan as they perform chores as part of their initiation into the big world!



### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

We are very proud here at The Grange Community Centre to offer programs, workshops and events that are specially designed for the needs of the community.

With a jam-packed calendar for 2023 we are excited to continue to offer a bigger range of workshops and events. These include health and wellbeing, arts and crafts, informative and social games.

Term 4 of 2022 we held two very successful events, Seniors Week morning tea and Christmas Luncheon. Both included entertainment, singing, dancing and delicious catering. We look forward to another year hosting similar events and more.

Treasurer's report tabled in 2021 Annual report. GCC has had positive financial

performance during 2021 and is in a good financial position going into 2022.
 For the year ending December 2021 GCC recorded a 132K surplus compared to \$464k the previous year. Government subsidies and grants received during 2021 account for the difference.

Operating income increased by 40% (\$277K). Despite Covid still being prevalent in the community, GCC performed well.

GCC has cash balances \$954K to cover the value of the total liabilities of \$221K. That is ratio of \$1: \$4.30 in current assets to pay off all obligations. Marlon acknowledged the work of Maria and staff during the year. He also thanked the Board for their work and support.
